

Early Childhood: Playgroups

Success in Learning for Aboriginal Children in Care

Introduction

Playgroups are for children under school age and their parents/carers. They can be a welcoming and safe place to connect with children through play and fun. They can be a stepping stone to early childhood learning & give information about local services.



Benefits

Playgroups can be a fun way to support parents and carers as the first educators for their children, help children and parents/carers to connect with others, try different activities and learn new skills. They can help

Playgroups that are run by an early childhood trained staff member can help with picking up concerns with the child's development & work with parent/carers to link them with the right supports.

Koori Playgroups

Some ACCOs run playgroups for their local community. These playgroups can help carers/parents & children to connect to culture & community. They support staff and Elders to build relationships with families.



Supported Playgroups

Supported Playgroups are group programs available to **some** families including families looking after a child in out of home care and Aboriginal families. They run weekly during the school term. The groups are run by trained facilitators. Some families may receive individual support in the home (In-Home Support) Victorian supported playgroups use the 'Smalltalk' parenting strategies. <u>Smalltalk | Giving your kids a great start</u>

Consider whether a a playgroup in your local ACCO or a supported playgroup works better for the family. Some families may need help with transport.
