Aboriginal Family Preservation and Reunification Response

The Aboriginal Family Preservation and Reunification Response (AFPRR)

The AFPRR is a new initiative to support vulnerable children and families. The response works in partnership with Child Protection to

- support children to stay safely at home with their family
- O prevent children and young people from entering care services
- support children and young people currently in care to safely reunify with their families

Under the response, Aboriginal Controlled Community Organisations (ACCOs) support Aboriginal families to create a safe and nurturing environment. The key goals are

- creating safety at home and preventing removal and placement in care (family preservation)
- safely and rapidly returning children to their home (family reunification)

How are children and families connected to the Response?

Children, young people, and families are identified for referral to the service by

- Child Protection: Child protection Navigators in collaboration with Child Protection practitioners
- Aboriginal Children in Aboriginal Care (ACAC): ACAC practitioners in consultation with the AFPRR team.
- Child First, Family Services and Orange Door

Connections (referrals) are agreed in consultation with Aboriginal Child Specialist Advice and Support Service (ACSASS).

What kind of support can you receive?

Families receive an initial phase of rapid, intensive, and flexible support (200 hours). This is followed by transition support (40 hours). The Response works with a whole-of-family approach that includes the child considered to be at-risk, and all children in the family aged between 0-17 years. The response includes flexible funding to help families meet their goals.

Each family works with an AFPRR lead practitioner. The support provided is based on the unique needs of the children and family. This includes:

- O Working with a family regularly at home or in place where they feel comfortable
- Supporting them to develop their own goals
- O Providing them with support and strategies to build their parenting skills and confidence
- C Linking families to other services and community supports as needed.

What makes the Aboriginal Response different?

The AFPRR process is led and delivered by ACCOs. ACCO practitioners lead care team meetings and work closely with other services. Culture underpins the AFPRR practice. Culturally safe engagement tools, reviews and measurement tools are embedded in the Response. Services are trauma informed. Families are the experts in their experience. They are supported to build capabilities and to achieve **their** goals.

All teams delivering the response need to complete training in practice models and Aboriginal cultural elements. Funding is also provided for evidence-based program development.
